

Judge Joseph Coats (deceased) was born in 1802, and was a native of Loudoun county, Virginia. At the age of two years he emigrated to Garret county, Kentucky, with his parents, Elisha and Celia (Furr) Coats, where he lived till grown. His father, Elisha Coats, was a native of Virginia, and was married prior to his marriage with Mrs. Celia (Furr) Hinds, and had two children. Miss Furr was first married to John Hinds, by whom she had five children. Elisha Coats, by his second wife, Mrs. Celia (Furr) Hinds, had two children: Joseph, the subject of this sketch, and Agnes (now Mrs. Cook).

H.W. Beckwith, History of Fountain County [Indiana] at 307 (Chicago 1881).

I have found very few Hinds or Hines records in Loudoun County. One David Hinds, an Irish convict servant, aged about 35, ran away from Samuel Love, Jr. of Loudoun County sometime prior to 25 July 1777, when Love advertised the fact in the Virginia Gazette, published at Williamsburg by Alexander Purdie. See Robert K. Headley, Jr., Genealogical Abstracts from 18th-Century Virginia Newspaper at 164 (Baltimore 1987). Neither John Hinds nor anyone else by that surname appears in Augusta Fothergill & John Mark Naugle's, Virginia Taxpayers 1782-1787 (1978), as a taxpayer in Loudoun County or any adjacent county. There are no Hinds marriages in the county until the 1830s and I was unable to locate any early Hinds deeds.

Nevertheless, John Hinds appears to have been a man of some property, judging by his inventory. The court ordered John's property to be appraised on 10 Sep 1799, and the inventory was taken 27 Jan 1800 and returned for record at a court held 9 Jun 1800 by Joseph Carr, Wm. H. Powell and William Fowke, as appraisors. (Loudoun Co prob recs F:178-80) The personal property and negroes were appraised at a total value of about £684:

Celia (Furr) (Hinds) Coats presumably removed to Garrard County, Kentucky about 1804 or 1805, as per the sketch of Joseph Coats quoted above and a reference in a sketch of Joseph's grandson: "[Joseph's] parents moved to Lancaster, Kentucky, when he was three years old, where they owned a tract of land and operated a 'still house.'" Thomas A. Clifton, Past and Present of Fountain and Warren Counties, Indiana at 678 (1913).

Previous to that time there had already been a James Hind who lived in Garrard County. On 3 Sep 1798, James appointed his friend Samuel Scott of Fayette County, Kentucky attorney-in-fact to recover all debts owed to James by John Aldison of Augusta County, Virginia, whom James had authorized to sell his three hundred acre entry in Augusta County adjoining his old tract "Bloodwords" or, if Aldison had not yet sold the property, to see to its sale. (Garrard LR A:168) A note in the Forrest Calico Collection indicates that James Hind of Shelby County, Kentucky sold property or gave a power of attorney in Garrard County in 1799 to Alice Watkins (my note is unclear).

Of Celia Coats' five Hinds children, I can establish the names of only three: Elizabeth, James and Moses. The record of the marriage of Betsy Hinds to Robert Fowler on 2 Jan 1813 in Garrard County indicates that the consent of the father, Sealy Coats, was given. Above this entry is written in pencil "(mother) Celia." (Annie Walker Burns, Record of Marriages in Garrard Co., Kentucky for the period of years 1796 to 1851 inclusive (1932) (probable source)). A biographical sketch of Moses Fowler, Elizabeth's son, indicates that he came to Fountain County, Indiana in 1830 with his uncle, James Hinds, and there made his residence with his uncle, Moses Hinds. (H.W. Beckwith, History of Fountain County [Indiana] at 316 (Chicago 1881)).

There were other Hinds individuals in Garrard County, but I cannot yet establish whether they were relatives. Garrard County marriages include:

A John A. Lapsley sold Thomas Hinds on 28 Aug 1820 (or 1821, the date is difficult to read and the deed was recorded 29 Aug 1821) an acre and a quarter lying on the road from Lancaster to Danville, adjacent to the land of Samuel McKee for \$400. The land appears to be the "lot where s^d Thomas Hinds now lives." (Garrard Co LR G:279) There are Garrard County land transactions in the 1850s involving Henry, John & Matilda Hinds.

Rebecca Hines is listed in the 1820 Garrard County census with a household consisted of two males under 10, one female 26<45 and one female 45+ (p. 86). Tho. Hines was also listed as engaged in agriculture in 1820 and his household consisted of one male <10, one male 10<16, one male 26<45, 2 females <10 and one female 26<45 (p. 117). In 1830, only Thomas Hines is listed and his family was as follows (p. 224):

On 17 Mch 1814, Zachariah and Mary Ann Green of Ba[th] County, Kentucky (the probable brother-in-law and sister of Robert Fowler, who had married Elizabeth Hinds in January 1813) conveyed to Delila Coats, Balis Coats, Joseph Coats and Agnes Coats, the heirs of Elijah Coats, deceased, for £ 133, 6 sh, and 4d, 107 acres, being part of a survey of 1000 acres made for John Bryant on the waters of Sugar Creek. (Garrard Co. LR E:172)

An interest in this property remained in the family for some time. On 22 Jun 1818, Delilah Coats of Garrard County sold for \$50 to Robert Fowler her fourth share in 111 acres conveyed to the heirs of Elijah Coats by Zachariah Green "whereon Cely Coats now lives also some money which still Remains of that estate." The deed was witnessed by Sannet, Charles and Polly Haze, the first two of whom proved the deed by oath before the clerk on 24 Oct 1818. (Garrard Co LR F:209) On 17 Sep 1827, Balis Coats of

Garrard County sold to Joseph Coats for \$60 the portion of this tract that had been laid off to him by the commissioners appointed by the court to divide the land and his rights in the dower of "my step mother." Robert Fowler and Moses F. Hinds were witnesses. (Garrard Co. LR J:604)

On 1 Sep 1828, Joseph Coats, Celia Coats and Agnes Coats sold a 97 acre portion of the original tract to Peter Urton for \$350. Robert Fowler and Henry Urton were the witnesses. (Garrard Co. LR J:645) Robert Fowler apparently sold Joseph Coats the interest he had acquired from Delilah Coats for \$120. Twenty years later, Joseph commenced a suit in Garrard Circuit Court to enforce a title bond Robert Fowler had given him in connection with the sale. On 14 Mch 1848, Paris M.C. Teater, Julia Ann Teater his wife (who signed as "Juliann") and Elizabeth Teater conveyed to Joseph Coats their interest in the property (described as "one sixth each") in accordance with the sale during Robert's life. Thomas M. Bennett and Mary, his wife, joined in the deed on 20 Mch 1848. (Garrard Co. LR Q:243) On 2 Jun 1848, W. Jennings Landram as Commissioner gave Coats a deed on behalf of all the heirs pursuant to the decree of the court. (Garrard Co. LR Q:303)

2. James Hinds

According to the dates on his gravestone in Rockfield cemetery, Van Buren township, Fountain County, Indiana, James Hinds was born 18 Aug 1790, probably in Virginia, the son of John and Celia (Furr) Hinds, and died 8 Dec 1852. Whether he was married previously is unknown, but, on 27 Mch 1828 at the age of 37, James married Elizabeth Allcorn in Fountain County, Indiana.

On 7 Dec 1826, James Hinds entered land in section 17, T19N, R7W in Fountain County and, on 27 Dec 1828, he entered additional land in section 8 of that township. Both sections were then in the large Cain township, but are now in the eastern part of Van Buren township, adjacent to Cain township. An early land entry in Fountain County by James Hinds, apparently dating from 1827, gives his former residence as Jessamine County, Kentucky. A biographical sketch of Moses Fowler indicates that Moses came to Fountain County in 1830 with his uncle James Hinds.

On 15 May 1835, George H. and Celia Blackburn of Fountain County, Indiana gave a power of attorney to James Hinds to collect Celia's share of the estate of her father, Robert Fowler of Garrard County, Kentucky. (Garrard Co. LR L:410)

3. Moses F. Hinds

According to the dates on his gravestone in Rockfield cemetery, Van Buren township, Fountain County, Indiana, Moses F. Hinds was born 11 July 1796, probably in Virginia, the son of John and Celia (Furr) Hinds, and died 13 March 1850. Whether he was married previously is unknown, but, on 11 March 1830 at the age of 33, Moses married Mary Furr in Fountain County, Indiana. Mary was born 12 Dec 1810, the daughter of William Furr, and died 8 June 1845. She is buried in Rockfield cemetery with her husband and four of their children.

Prior to removing to Fountain County, Moses lived in Garrard County, Kentucky, where, on 18 Feb 1823, he bought 135 acres on Sugar Creek from Aaron Acton and Sillar, his wife for \$1000 in commonwealth money. (Garrard Co. LR H:250) On 29 March 1826, Moses bought from John Bryant for \$20 an additional eight acres on Sugar Creek. (Garrard Co. LR J:365) The same month and probably the same day, Moses sold 143 acres on Sugar Creek to Samuel Ray for 600 silver dollars, which land appears to be the combined property he had purchased from Aaron Acton and John Bryant. (Garrard Co. LR J:366) In all these deeds, Moses is called "of Garrard County."

On 13 Mch 1833, Moses F. Hines bought some of the land sold by the County Commissioners in section 16 (the section reserved for support of the public schools) of T19N, R7W. Section 16 is now in the western part of Cain township, adjacent to Van Buren township.

In the 1840 census, Moses F. Hinds was listed in Cain township, Fountain County:

The male between 20 and 30 was probably Moses Fowler, Moses Hinds' nephew, who was said to have lived with Moses.

On 17 Oct 1842, Moses F. Hinds was appointed one of the administrators of the estate of Jacob Hesler, late of Fountain County and, on 15 Jan 1844, Mose F. Hinds was appointed the administrator of the estate of Joseph Furr of the same county.

4. Joseph Coats

Joseph Coats was born 28 Dec 1802 at Paris, Loudoun County, Virginia, the son of Elijah and Celia (Furr) Coats, and died in Fountain County, Indiana on 9 Nov 1877. He is buried in Rockfield cemetery in Van Buren township. On 24 Dec 1829 in Fountain County, he married Serena Delia White, a daughter of Capt. William White. She was born 13 Jul 1809 in Roan County, Tennessee and died 17 Dec 1906, in Van Buren township, Fountain County, Indiana.

Joseph Coats was a prominent citizen of Fountain County and his biography is found in H.W. Beckwith's, History of Fountain County [Indiana] at 307-308 (Chicago 1881):

Judge Joseph Coats (deceased) was born in 1802, and was a native of Loudoun county, Virginia. At the age of two years he emigrated to Garret county, Kentucky . . . where he lived till grown. . . . Judge Coats was educated as a farmer, receiving no literary training beyond the limits of the pioneer schools of Kentucky. He possessed a natural fondness for books, and let no opportunity for gathering knowledge pasee unheeded. Thus it was he became a fair scholar, and well posted and thoroughly conversant on all practical subjects. In 1828 he came to Fountain county . . . The judge then [in 1829] located in Van Buren township, southeast of Veedersburg one and a half miles. By this union he had one child. Among the early men of Fountain county none were more prominent than Judge Coats. He was called to fill several of the first offices in the gift of the people of Fountain, among which are the following: In 1830 he was appointed deputy marshal of Fountain county, and made the first enumeration of property and persons in that

county. He was one of the first three trustees who took measures for organizing free schools in Van Buren township.

He was elected probate judge for Fountain county in 1841, which office he filled until he was elected state senator in 1844. In this last office he served until 1848. In 1850 he was elected senatorial delegate to the constitutional convention by the citizens of Fountain county. Following the adoption of the present state constitution he retired from public life and again resumed the business of farming, which he pursued with success, accumulating a handsome property. Prior to 1854 he voted with the democratic party.

In 1856 he united with the republican party, voting with the same till his death. He was a strong advocate of the war for the suppression of the rebellion. He manifested a hearty interest in behalf of universal intellectual culture.

The poor and unfortunate touched the sympathetic cords of his great heart. Several friendless orphans found under his roof a comfortable home and a father. His view were always broad and liberal. . . .

5. Wesley Hinds

Wesley was born about 1831 in Indiana, the son of James Hinds and Elizabeth Allcorn, and died in Sterling, Fountain County, Indiana on 18 Feb 1895, age 64 (H-19:212) He married Elizabeth Anderson in Fountain County on 25 Dec 1853 (3:471). She died 9 July 1855, age 23y, 11m and 28d (bu: Veedersbury town cemetery). Wesley married, second, Rosetta Ward on 24 July 1856 in Fountain County (4:163).

6. William Baliver(?) Coats

William Baliver Coats was born 18 Oct 1830 in Fountain County, Indiana, the son of Joseph and Serena Delia (White) Coats and died in 1897. On 19 Feb 1852 in Fountain County, he married Elizabeth Martha Lucas, the daughter of J.G. Lucas. She was born 11 Dec 1834 and was living in 1913.

A sketch of William's son Elmer E. Coats says:

William B. Coats . . . grew up on his father's farm and he was educated in the country schools and at Wabash College, Crawfordsville, Indiana. He took up farming for a livelihood early in life and followed the same until his death with a large degree of success, becoming one of the substantial and influential men of his community. . . . To William B. Coats and his wife were born the following children: Laurel, who married Leroy Clore, of Crawfordsville; Frank is a farmer; Elmer E., subject of this sketch; Dora, now deceased, was the wife of Joseph Sims; Charles is a farmer and lives at Veedersburg, Indiana; Joseph L. was next in order [sketch published at 840-41 of same book]; Emma and Edna are both deceased.

William B. Coats was a Republican, and he was for two terms county commissioner. He was a member of the Christian church.

Thomas A. Clifton, Past and Present of Fountain and Warren Counties, Indiana at 679 (Indianapolis 1913). Despite the order of children given, Joseph appears to have been one of the oldest.

William and Elizabeth had seven children as of 1881, according to the biographical sketch of Joseph Coats. I assume that they were the couple listed in the 1880 census in Van Buren township (p. 27; 200/210):
