

You can cabitz with old friends, meet new ones—and try to figure out how you're related.

Saturday Night at 7:00 p.m. we convene in the Checkers Room for an informal and intriguing session about interesting and informative genealogical facts about our ancestors. Subjects are: The Sanford Cox Legacy; Mary Cox Freeland and son; Places Searched for John Cox; Spanish Blood Spices Our Ancestors; and, Three Cox Stories - Are They Related? Possibly you will learn

of the many Cox ancestors who entered the field of education. Everyone is invited to come! Your questions and discussion are important. Snacks and beverages available at no charge.

Sunday at 11:30 A.M. the Cox Clan will gather in the *Checkers Room* for a reunion photograph. This difficult task must include writing of names at the proper positions for identification of each face.
